

Food scraps collections

Auckland's new food scraps collection service has been introduced in Papakura and will be rolled out across urban Auckland by 2021. The three-bin service will help Aucklanders reduce household waste and save money on rubbish disposal. It will be funded by a new targeted rate of \$67 a year, which will only apply where the service is available. Visit ourauckland.nz for more information.

Apply for a greening grant

Applications for Auckland Council's 2018/2019 Regional **Environment and Natural** Heritage grants programme are open now. The grants offer funding of between \$5000 and \$40,000 to support groups which protect, restore or enhance Auckland's significant natural heritage environment. Message from the mayor

Auckland's 10-year Budget is finalised, and our city has embarked on a decade of investment that will create a better transport system; support the provision of housing; clean up our beaches, harbours and streams; and protect our environment.

We now have a plan that responds to our unprecedented population growth with the biggest infrastructure build in Auckland's history, and that brings the council, central government, NGOs and the private sector together behind the common goal of transforming our city.

We're building an age-friendly city

In July, Auckland Council resolved to join the World Health Organisation Global Network for Age-friendly Cities and Communities.

The global network helps cities share information to improve the quality of life for older people.

The council's Seniors Advisory Panel has been a strong advocate for joining the network, and its

The Seniors Advisory Panel successfully advocated

for Auckland to join a global age-friendly network.

chairperson, Janet Clews, says the decision shows a commitment to improving the city for all Aucklanders.

"An age-friendly city is more inclusive and beneficial for everyone, regardless of their age," she says.

Councillor Cathy Casey agrees, and says that Auckland will be home to larger numbers and

greater proportions of ethnically and culturally diverse older people in the coming decades.

"Our older population is growing faster than any other age group," she says.

"Our senior population is predicted to increase from 11 per cent in 2013 to 19 per cent by 2046, so we must work to ensure our city is a great place for everyone, at all stages of their lives."

Joining the age-friendly network will help achieve these goals, says Councillor Daniel Newman.

"Membership of the network requires us to commit to a continuous improvement process for creating age-friendly environments," he says.

Life in the bike lane

Aucklanders are biking in greater numbers, and are more positive about cycling in the city.

Thirty-eight per cent of Aucklanders are riding bikes in 2018, up three percentage points from last year, Auckland Transport's latest Active Modes Research shows.

The research is carried out annually by TRA on behalf of Auckland Transport (AT) and is continuing to show cycling's growth across the city, with 518,000 people now riding regularly or occasionally.

"In 2018, 52,000 people started bike riding, compared to 46,500 last year," says Kathryn King, AT's Manager for Walking, Cycling and Road Safety.

"The numbers show that travelling by bike is becoming an increasingly important way for people to get around Auckland.

"People are going about their daily lives on bikes

they're travelling to work and school, and they're supporting local businesses."

Cycle lanes are also becoming more popular, King says: "65 per cent of Aucklanders now believe cycle lanes are good and support them in their community."

And the increasing popularity of cycling is being matched with increased investment by Auckland Council, says Councillor Chris Darby, who chairs the council's Planning Committee.

"More and more people are choosing to travel by bike, and Aucklanders have told us they want more cycling options," he says.

"Over the next decade, we will invest around \$900 million into cycling infrastructure, so that even more people are able to travel safely and easily by bike." Visit **ourauckland.nz** to find out more.

Libraries

We operate 55 libraries and four research centres across Auckland. As well as providing access to physical and digital books, libraries provide programmes, events and community space as well as public computers, free wi-fi and research services. They also provide expertise in local history and have an internationally regarded special collection that preserves Auckland's documentary heritage.



Contact centre

Our contact centre is open 24/7 and helps Aucklanders with a wide range of questions, from reporting dumped rubbish to registering dogs and booking building inspections.

The contact centre receives about **2.5** million calls a year

Historic moment for Te Kawerau ā Maki

Auckland Council's Finance and Performance Committee recently voted to transfer land to enable Te Kawerau ā Maki to construct a marae and papakāinga at Bethells Road, Te Henga.

Edward Ashby, the executive manager of the iwi, says, "The decision marks a historic moment for Te Kawerau ā Maki, who were left without a marae for decades.

"The iwi will strengthen their presence within their tribal heartland with the new eco-marae and papakāinga."

Biosecurity chooks help those in need


Chickens hunting plague skinks on Aotea Great Barrier as part of an Auckland Council biosecurity experiment are now supplying eggs to the Auckland City Mission.

With the help of SeaLink, the Great Barrier ferry operator, the eggs are shipped to the mainland and donated to the mission to help make up food parcels for people in need.

Auckland City Missioner Chris Farrelly is delighted that the biosecurity chickens are able to supply the eggs.

"In the past 12 months the mission has provided 15,000 emergency food parcels to families and individuals," he says.

"To be able to include such a great source of protein as eggs in the food parcels is absolutely amazing."





Uxbridge Arts and Culture

Founded in 1981, Uxbridge is the arts and culture hub of east Auckland and is just a one-minute walk from the main street of Howick Village.

This arts and culture facility offers a space for Aucklanders to express their creativity, participate in exciting events and learn about contemporary art.

The centre was redeveloped in 2016 and features the newly built Malcolm Smith Gallery and a heritage church as a dedicated theatre.

More than 100,000 people visit Uxbridge every year to view exhibitions, and attend classes, theatre performances and events.

Visitors can take part in creative workshops every weekend, explore exhibitions by local artists, attend a show or one of the many free family-friendly events, grab a bite at the café and more.

Castor oil plant

Castor oil plant, also known as *Ricinus* communis or castor bean plant, can invade open or closed areas in gardens, roadsides and waste areas, and can out-compete native plants.

It has glossy, pointed leaves that start off dark red and gradually change to a dark green colour with a reddish tinge as they mature. Spiky reddish flowers develop into spiny reddish-purple capsules that split to release large, oval, bean-like seeds that are very poisonous.

The rest of the plant is poisonous too, and is dangerous to humans and animals. Take care when controlling and removing castor oil plant, and wear protective clothing, gloves and eyewear. Keep children and animals away, and if you think poisoning has occurred, call 0800 POISON (0800 764 766).

Pull out castor oil plant seedlings, and spray



larger plants or cut them back and paint the stumps with herbicide.

We're reviewing wastewater bylaws

Auckland Council is proposing to revoke four legacy bylaws that relate to the regulation of on-site wastewater management.

The bylaws were created to ensure that septic tanks and wastewater treatment systems are properly installed and maintained.

They cover the former areas of North Shore City, Waiheke, Papakura and Rodney District councils.

Now that the Auckland Unitary Plan is operative, the legacy bylaws are no longer required, because the unitary plan regulates on-site wastewater systems for all of Auckland.

Existing legislation also provides stronger enforcement powers than the old bylaws.

The council reviewed a statement of proposal to revoke the four bylaws in July.

If the statement of proposal is accepted, the bylaw review will go out for consultation at the beginning of August.

The consultation will seek feedback from stakeholders and the public.


