

Getting closer to zero waste

Smokefree outdoor dining starts in July

Ninety restaurants, bars and cafes with licences for outdoor dining on council spaces in Waitākere, Manurewa and Papakura will be required to be smoke free from July. In August, a further 600 establishments across the region will also be subject to the smokefree rules as part of the council's goal to make Auckland a smokefree city by 2025.

Message from the mayor

For decades, critical issues facing Auckland have sat in the too-hard basket. Traffic congestion has worsened, our environment has suffered, and the city's infrastructure has not received the funding it needs to cope with our growing population.

In May, we signed a budget that will allow us to finally start addressing these issues. Our Build-it budget includes the biggest infrastructure investment in Auckland's history – \$26.2 billion over 10 years to help us create a city with a better transport network, more housing, cleaner water and a healthier environment (see p6-7).

As well as this transformative investment in infrastructure, we're helping make Auckland an exciting, safe and inclusive city. This involves funding things like sports and recreation, cultural facilities, services provided by charitable organisations and community initiatives.

Being an inclusive city also requires that we support our most vulnerable residents. In September, we are supporting and funding the Housing First Auckland collective to carry out Ira Mata, Ira Tangata - the first region-wide count of people experiencing homelessness in Auckland. The results will inform planning, policymaking and service delivery to support our homeless population. It's a crucial step in our journey to ending homelessness in Auckland, and I'm proud that we're

partners in this mission.

Bus service changes in central suburbs

Changes for bus users in Auckland's central suburbs take effect on 8 July.

New routes, timetables, and in some cases bus stops will improve crosstown routes and offer better offpeak and weekend services with more frequent buses.


Frequent routes will run to and from the city seven days a week at least every 15 minutes until late evening, and the new bus network will be better connected and easier to understand.

Development will create 300 homes in Manukau

A major housing development in the heart of Auckland's south will create 300 new homes over the next five years.

The new neighbourhood – Kōtuitui Place – at 20 Barrowcliffe Place in Manukau will offer a range of dwellings, from one-bedroom apartments to four-bedroom houses.

At least 50 per cent will be sold under an affordable housing

scheme in a range of purchase models, including rent-to-buy and shared equity.

Tīeke welcomed to Shakespear sanctuary

In May, 40 tīeke (North Island saddlebacks) arrived from Tiritiri Matangi to their new home at the Shakespear Open Sanctuary in Whangaparāoa.

They will be joined by 10 tieke from the Tāwharanui population set up in 2012.

This noisy and beautiful New Zealand bird, a smaller relative of the kōkako and huia, was once widespread across the North Island. But its mainland population was wiped out by introduced predators by the late 1800s, and the species at one time survived only on a single offshore island.

Auckland Council works with community partner Shakespear
Open Sanctuary Society (SOSSI), and landowners NZ Defence Force
and Watercare, to ensure a predator-free habitat and a suitable haven for
threatened native wildlife at Shakespear.

Build-it budget gets green light

In May, after consulting with Aucklanders, the council agreed to the largest-ever investment in Auckland's infrastructure: \$26.2 billion over the next 10 years.

Auckland Mayor Phil Goff says, "This Build-it budget will kick off 10 years of transformative work to tackle the critical issues of transport, congestion and protecting our environment.

"These issues have sat in the too-hard basket for too long, but not any more. Auckland Council has taken responsibility for creating a better Auckland that will over time have a more efficient and effective transport network, more houses, cleaner water and a healthier environment."

Investing in transport

Our \$12 billion capital investment in the Auckland Transport Alignment Project will enable more frequent and reliable public transport, improve road safety and address traffic congestion as the city grows. It's supported by a regional fuel tax of 10 cents per litre plus GST that will enable about \$4.5 billion of transport investment across Auckland. These investments will help us build a city that's safer and easier to travel around



Improving our water

Many of Auckland's beaches, harbours, streams and aquifers have poor water quality. We had planned to fix the issues causing this problem over the next 30 years – now we're going to do it in 10 years. Some of this work will be funded by water and wastewater charges, and the rest (\$452 million) by a water quality targeted rate.



Protecting the environment

An environment targeted rate will enable us to spend \$311 million to help tackle the pests, weeds and diseases – including kauri dieback disease – that are threatening many of our native birds and trees.



Keeping our city running

To help provide the services and facilities to run our growing city, we are increasing general rates by an average of 2.5 per cent for the next two years and 3.5 per cent for the remaining eight years of the budget. The current interim transport levy of \$114 for residential and \$183 for business properties will cease.

Other items from the budget include:

- establishing a \$40 million Climate Change Response Fund and providing an additional \$90 million for coastal asset management
- establishing a contestable fund of \$120 million for sports and recreation facilities
- providing an additional \$20 million of funding for Auckland Art Gallery.

Auckland's water services are managed by two council groups. Watercare, a council-controlled organisation, looks after our drinking water and wastewater, and Auckland Council's Healthy Waters Department manages Auckland's public stormwater infrastructure and improvements to waterways.

Watercare and Healthy Waters have dozens of projects underway at any one time.*



Keeping Your Pipes Flowing



Stormwater downpipe & drain

Where possible, ensure your property has separate stormwater and wastewater pipes. When stormwater enters the wastewater network, it can cause overflows. Check that the stormwater drains on your property connect to the stormwater network. If any drains smell or look like they have sewage in them, there may be a problem.

Rainwater or retention tanks

Tanks can collect water from hard surfaces and store it for many uses:

- watering your garden
- · washing your car
- supplying your washing machine and toilet.
- Toilet

Flush toilet paper and human waste only.

Private pipes

Ensure your private stormwater and wastewater pipes are connected properly and maintained.

Kitchen sink

Scrape cooking fat into the bin. Fat can harden when it cools and may block pipes.

Gully trap

Ensure your gully trap is raised off the ground to prevent rainwater from entering the wastewater network. Raised gully traps also protect your family's health by ensuring that wastewater will not overflow into your home if there is a blockage.

Plan your tree planting

Before planting a tree, check that it's not going to grow over your pipes or ours.

Manholes

Give us a call

If you come across any wastewater overflow from a manhole, please phone us on 09 442 2222. If you come across a missing, dislodged or damaged stormwater manhole cover, contact us urgently on 09 301 0101.

Hazardous waste

Do not pour hazardous waste such as paint, pesticides, solvents and used automobile oil down any drain, toilet or sink. To find out how to dispose of hazardous waste, visit aucklandcouncil. govt.nz and search 'hazardous waste'.

Septic tanks

If you have a septic tank, ensure it is regularly maintained and checked by a professional. Septic tanks need a pump-out service every three to five years to remove scum and sludge build-up.

Start your own pest-control group

Our top tips for starting a pest-control group in your neighbourhood.

Decide on your goals

Be clear about which pest animals or plants you want to target. You should also decide on a time frame: how long do you expect it to take to eradicate this pest from the area? Write this information up in a plan.

Sort out your gear

Work out what equipment you'll need and how you'll pay for it. You could consider fundraising, asking for donations, or applying for a local board grant.

Apply for a permit

If you plan to work in a park, on private land, or on land owned by the Department of Conservation, you'll need to get a permit.

Find some volunteers

Advertise for volunteers on a community noticeboard, or on your local Facebook page. Organise a meeting to talk about your ideas, and keep in touch with anyone interested.





Gordon Walters: New Vision

One of NZ's most important modern artists, Gordon Walters explored the potential of a few simple geometric elements with a singular focus. This exhibition is the first comprehensive survey of his complete body of work.
