#### Introduction

The annual Mayoral Conservation Awards recognise and celebrate communitypowered conservation.

The Awards are an opportunity to acknowledge the significant effort made by mana whenua, communities, households, landowners, youth and schools across Tāmaki Makaurau Auckland, in supporting our region's nature to thrive.

COVID-19 has impacted this year's awards, with the usual six categories reduced to three. Also, in response to feedback the nomination process has been simplified.

2020 is the inaugural year of the 'Penny Hulse Supreme Environment Award', recognising the contribution the former councillor has made to the environment. This award encapsulates the achievements of one of the winners of the three other categories - Collaboration, Schools and Youth, and Triumph Against Adversity.

Nominations are open to all conservation projects in the Tāmaki Makaurau Auckland region carried out on private land, or public parks and reserves managed by Auckland Council or the Department of Conservation.

This year's awards ceremony will take place on the first day of the 'Auckland Pestival Weekend 2020', Saturday 28 November, in partnership with the Department of Conservation. Day Two's 'CitiSci' event on Sunday 29 November is brought to you in partnership with Auckland Museum Institute and the University of Auckland's School of Environment and will be held at the Science Centre, city campus. #### 1 Pest Free Auckland and COVID-19

Since the Government launched Predator Free 2050, we have seen an everincreasing number of Aucklanders getting behind the push to restore our natural environment. It is relentless work eradicating or controlling pest plants and animals, and pathogens, to help restore nature. It is this growing commitment, and the hard work that accompanies it, that is helping us reach the goal of a Pest Free Auckland by 2050.

#### 2 Categories and judging criteria

This year there are three award categories:

- Collaboration
- Schools / Youth
- Triumph Against Adversity

And the Penny Hulse Supreme Environment Award, presented to one of the winners of the above categories.

Applicants can choose the most appropriate of the three categories that best suits their project by considering how it meets the judging criteria.

## 3 Judging panel process

The judging panel will:

- assess each nomination against the criteria of the selected category
- decide on three finalists and a winner for each category
- decide on the Penny Hulse Supreme Environment Award from the three award winners.

The judging panel reserves the right to:Can

- decline giving an award in any category if they believe there are no exceptional entries in a given year, and
- change or move a nomination to an alternate category.

The decision of the judging panel is final.

#### 4 Prizes

Finalists will be announced on Our Auckland on 19 November (search: finalists).

The category winners will be presented with their award/s on Day One of the Auckland Pestival Weekend 2020, Saturday 28 November, an event to which all finalists will be invited.

- All finalists will be recognised by receiving a certificate of commendation signed by Mayor Phil Goff.
- All category winners will be recognised by receiving a 2020 Mayoral Conservation Awards framed certificate signed by Mayor Phil Goff.
- The winner of the Penny Hulse Supreme Environmental Award will receive a bespoke framed certificate signed by Mayor Phil Goff acknowledging both awards and \$2,000 towards their project.

To enter:

- provide three to six high resolution photos of one or more aspects of the project; you
  can also send short videos or provide links to these via email; see below for the email
  address.

Rules of entry:

- nominations are open to all community-powered conservation projects in the Tāmaki Makaurau Auckland region
- a new aspect of the project must have taken place since 1 January 2020
- your nomination can be for the whole project or an aspect of your project
- your nomination can be for any of the three categories
- you cannot nominate the same project/aspect in more than one category, so remember to choose the category that best reflects your nomination.
- you can submit more than one nomination you will need to fill in separate forms for each.
